He was a very helpful individual and one warm memory about Ed was when he drove five of us new hires to have our picture taken for our Government ID badges. His US Navy days made him an organized individual and discipline about details so it was no surprise, in retrospect, that our supervisor appointed him to show us some of the ropes. With the first day on the job preliminary paper and filling out forms is a norm, well Ed made sure we had crossed all the t's and dotted all the i's before we handed the paper work back to the secretary. Ed was always ready to tutor me in Mathematics dealing with electrical circuits supporting FAA systems. To some of us he was literally a Big Brother and mentor when mentoring as not thought of.
