Mr. Weydert passed away Wednesday, December 31, 2025 in Tyler, TX. He was born June 19, 1939 in Dubuque, Iowa to Harold and Marie Weydert.

Ronald was a member of Our Savior Lutheran Church in Tyler, Texas. He graduated from Loras College in Dubuque, Iowa. He held the position of Manager of Shared Services for Technical Information Authoring Worldwide Agriculture Equipment Division with John Deere. Mr. Weydert retired in 2004 after 41 years with Deere & Company. After retirement, Ronald along with his wife Terry, moved to Texas to begin the next chapter in their lives. Ronald could often be seen sporting his leather vest and Justin cowboy boots. He served honorably in the US Army Reserves from 1962-1968. His hunting trips with his brothers and good friends were a major highlight in Ronald's life. He also enjoyed reminiscing of times with his siblings on the farm. He had an unwavering love and respect for all animals and never hesitated to provide help or a home for a stray animal in need. Anyone that knew Ronald knew that he loved his dogs

who were constant companions to him.
